Andy Zimmerman opened up registration for the June 22-23 Show & Sale last week and vendors began signing up on the first day! The first in was Rick Wolfe of Bay Minette, AL, a regular, and we welcome Rick back. He will have three tables with used engines and rolling stock in N HO and O.

"Welcome to the Panhandle's largest model railroad show and sale!" Andy noted in a "blast

fax" delivered by email. "The Big Bend Model Railroad Association's

(BBMRA) 2024 Tallahassee Model Railroad Show & Sale will be held on June 22 and 23 at the North Florida Fairgrounds in Buildings 2 and 4 from 9 am to 5 pm on Saturday and 9-4 pm on Sunday.

Set up will occur Friday, June 21, beginning at 8 am for exhibitors with layouts and 10 am for vendors, until 5 pm, and Saturday morning from 7 am to 8:30 am.



As in previous years, vendor tables rent for \$30 if folks register and pay by May 11; \$35 after that. We sold out our 150 tables last year for the 2023 show by the middle of April and had a long waiting list.

Cairo History Museum: A "Secret Garden" of Model Trains; BBMRA Agrees to Help Out!

The Grady County History Museum in Cairo is like "The Secret Garden" depicted in the 1910 children's novel and the 1993 movie. Two



operating O Gauge trains in the store front window offer a tease, but you have no idea what is really there until you see it. It includes the largest and best operating indoor Garden Railroad exhibit I have ever seen, an O Gauge layout loosely depicting historic, old town Cairo and walls full of model and prototype railroading displays.

The museum was established to document Grady County's history, and it does, with exhibits on Jackie Robinson, born and raised near Cairo; the Muscogee Creek Indian history of the area; a real, last century barber shop; and an old school classroom. But a large area is devoted to model trains. Hampton Ward, a former Cairo resident now living in Atlanta, donated the trains to the museum in 2012 and a \$100,000 grant to Train Installations of Atlanta to set it up.

The exhibit is labeled the Grady Crossing Railroad. "The collection of authentically recreated scale models of historic trains delights young and old visitors," The History Museum notes on its Internet site. It consists of "five fully functioning trains and meticulously detailed scenery... Historically accurate trains depict the actual life-sized cars that served this area of South Georgia."

"Of special interest is a replica of the old Pelham and Havana Railroad which, although never completed, served most of the projected route for a decade. Nicknamed the 'Poor and Hungry' from its initials, the railroad is legendary for the personal service it provided to area residents," the Internet site continues.

"Other railroad memorabilia donated by Mr. Ward details the history and romance of the rails, its daily operations, and mechanics."

"Our community has really embraced it. Children bring their parents and grandparents, and they love it just as much as the kids," said Don Nickerson, the museum director. "Everyone really enjoys it. This has been a big boon for us." The trains "are the most popular feature of the museum, "to say the least." The museum applied to the City Council for use of part of the old train depot about a block away for the model train exhibit. "The whole community backed the idea," Don says. But council members wanted a retail revenue-producing enterprise in the old depot "and it is now a pizza parlor."

BBMRA has begun a special relationship with the History Museum and Don Nickerson, the museum director. Bob and Connie Ruggles of our club learned that some of the trains were not operating properly, and Nickerson needed some help. Ward comes down from Atlanta every few months and fixes what he can. One of the store front trains had stopped running. Ward got it going again, but a few days after he returned to Atlanta, it stopped again, Don notes.

Bob Ruggles talked about the museum's model railroad problems on a Zoom call. Club members, including Vice President Stacey Elliott and folks in our Sunday group,

agreed to help and we spent several hours at the Cairo museum last month - Stacey, Sam, David McDonald, Barbara Donner, and Randy Lombardo.

Two O Gauge locomotives needed new traction tires and David took care of that. Stacey is working on a beacon car and caboose which were causing a short in the store front window trains.

We will be going back to the museum soon and Don Nickerson hopes to get down for the June 22-23 show on that Sunday when the museum is not open.

"Signal lanterns, spikes, flagman and conductor uniforms, china cups and saucers, signs, schedules, original photographs, and much more recreate the sights and sounds of a bygone era. Children come in with their parents and grandparents to see the trains but all leave with the childlike wonder of the rails in their eyes," the History Museum says on its Internet site.

We model railroading fanatics are not likely to lose "the childlike wonder of the rails" in our eyes. But if we do, the Cairo model train museum is a wonderful place to get it back.

The Grady County History Museum is located at 101 North Broad Street in Cairo. The operating hours are 1 to 4p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturdays. It is closed on Sunday and Monday.






From President Andy Zimmerman:

BBMRA 2024 Layout Tour

The Layout Tour was a success with over 25 people participating. The group met first at Tom Rush's house and viewed his HO layout. Toms's layout is in one of his bedrooms and is very detailed and totally digitally operated. He models the area around Crawfordville and the railroad that operated there. I was impressed at how much he was able to get on his layout – various levels and grades.

We next all went to Joe Hayley's house and visited his "Shed." He and Doug Gyuricsko have worked for weeks getting Joe's layout back in operating order. For several years it had been unusable after some storm damage. Now it is in working order with some new track, industries, and businesses. Stacey Elliott and I have been working on our NMRA certification for Dispatcher. We talked with Joe and Doug about working to get the layout ready to conduct operations so we and others could work on those points without having to travel to Gainesville, Lake City, or Jacksonville in order to complete it all. Quite a bit of prep has to be done to set up for an operations session, but it will be a fun project.

Next on the Layout Tour was at Ed Schroeder's house. Ed's layout fills the majority of a two-car garage. It is HO Scale and is called the New Orleans and North Eastern. The L&N Railroad has a starring role in the rolling

stock. The New Orleans part represents Ed's hometown where he grew up and the other part, the North Eastern part represents where his wife, Marietta, grew up. I know it is in the Northeastern part of the US but at this point, I can't remember where and as usual, I did not write it down. I liked his layout because it was almost chest high to me so was easy to see the rolling stock as it glided by. Ed regaled us with his many stories of life in New Orleans in his early years. We all had a great time there.

After lunch we headed over to Gary Edwards' residence. Gary's Lionel layout fills one half a two car garage and is very extensive. He has lots of switches and sensors that help with the "Train Disappearing In The Mountain" feature. It was pretty neat.

I never had any Lionel gear, but I am thinking Gary has most everything Lionel offered for their trains. He displayed the barrel loading and unloading, the log loading and unloading siding, and the log to lumber mill factory. Things like the signal tower with the switchman stepping outside to inspect as the train went by. He had dual tracks and had trains on both tracks. We turned out the lights in the garage to see all the buildings lit up like Christmas trees. Lots of lights! I really like the station with the conductor announcing the departure of the trains



and their destinations. Pretty neat!

A great day was had by all! The society editor for my hometown newspaper always used that line at the end of all her articles on weddings and other social events. I couldn't resist an opportunity to use it. The picture sections below are from each of the sessions. Enjoy!



Small Scale – Stacey did not have much to add re small scale activities except for a planned outing at Easter. He also mentioned a possible workday on the 30^{th} of March.


Layout Tour - Andy Millot chimed in on logistics for the layout tour on the weekend.
